

AALF ANNOUNCES NEW WHITEPAPER: THE RIGHT TO LEARN!

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The Anytime Anywhere Learning Foundation (AALF), Maine International Center for Digital Learning (MICDL), and ideasLAB of Australia recently released a new white paper, *The Right to Learn: Identifying Precedents for Sustaining Change*.

Authored by AALF President Bruce Dixon and Executive Director Susan Einhorn, the paper outlines a radically new view of education and learning that emphasizes the protection and defense of every child's inherent right to learn. It asks whether our traditional system of education has reached the limits of its capacity to serve all learners and emphasizes the need for a shift in perspective, from a policy of delivery - delivering an education - to one that focuses on empowering young people to use their innate curiosity and drive to learn wherever and whenever they want.

According to Dixon and Einhorn, "We are calling for a re-evaluation of current practices to remove those that prevent rather than allow the exercise of each person's right to learn. With the increased access to information and new communities of practice brought about through technology and 1:1 laptop programs in schools, this shift is both necessary and now very possible."

The Right to Learn was developed from ideas expressed during conversations at the first Big Ideas Global (B.I.G.) 1:1 Summit held June, 2010, in Maine. Click [here](#) to download a copy of the white paper.


A SYNOPSIS OF PROJECT RED
